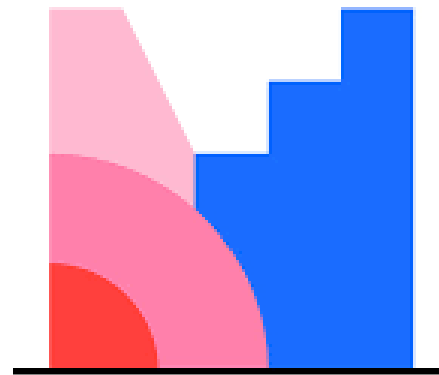

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Discussion on Survey Responses

Helen Dent

BIVDA

- Ben called 67 registered members of the DWP.
- Spoke to 20 members.
- 44 have failed to reply to Ben's messages.
- 3 No longer work at the company.
- Survey covers 30% of DWP and 9% of all members.
- Have simplified responses for the purpose of this session.

* HD to follow up with main contacts of companies to expand results.

- 1. DWP propose that that Digital Governance becomes the overarching focus with 3 subgroups which members can focus on depending on their needs.
 - *Topics relating to Data e.g. who owns the data, what can we do with it, where should it be reported? GDPR, HIPAA, Cloud based systems, Big Data – what does this mean to the IVD industry?*
 - *Topics relating to day-to-day operational IT issues - Windows 10 and IVDR compliance. Laboratory data LIMS, NHS perspective and interoperability.*
 - *Topics relating to connected tools, Internet of Things (IoT) – test readers, portable PCR, Apps, mHealth, wearable diagnostics*

- Do you agree with this approach? Do you have any further comment?
- YES = 16
- NO = 2 (not interested in Digital/ Too Broad)
- Other = 2 (No time to answer, referred to a colleague.)

Survey Questions

- Is there a priority topic among the 3 and why?
- Data (GDPR/ Patient Data) = 9
- Operations and Regulations (IVDR/UKCA) = 9
- Connected Tools = 2
- Other suggestions = AI/ CDS/Innovation to drive manufacturing.

- What does 'digital' mean for you as a UK company? Same internationally?
- Same across the world - do things remotely, rely on data that can go straight into patient records.
- Digital means products to sell and also the framework within which NHSE will operate, need more clarity about different requirements.
- Enabler and facilitator of services primarily to the NHS and private labs - data, tests etc.
- Covid home working IT systems, developing digital products, apps etc, digital security and safety of data, customer safety and operability.
- Big data, using data effectively, digitisation, all for the benefit of labs. Operational processes/automation.
- Digitisation of the NHS - labnostics. What requiremenrs are needed in future, info about hospital connectivity.
- Means capturing data of non-connected analyser, gather data and centralise.
- Same UK and internationally, safe methods of transferring (both data and equipment, communication) key to this.
- GDPR etc/systems but also digital in terms of how tech will communicate with professionals/data.
- Fulfilling NHS needs based on digital rules while driving best standards.
- Data that is generated from tests and how that is handled.
- Digitisation: paperless, automation etc, less on operational stuff. How can we improve society/patients through digital.
- 5 different buckets could be 'digital'. SEO and Windows very different to say AI.
- Specialist equipment supplier - see a huge opportunity to consolidate through digital connectivity between patient and hospital
- UK and international requirements the same - how we use and comply by local rules in each territory.
- New digitisation in products, massive changes ahead, how do we digitise equipment and support it? Seamless connectivity for customers.

Survey Questions

- Who in organisation is responsible for Digital and where are they based?
- DWP registered person
- All UK based.
- Observations – was intended to determine role and whether Digital strategy was determined in UK.
- All DWP registrants appear to be the only organisational interested party. This is unlikely.
- Need to discuss further.

Survey Questions

- Would you value education/regulatory support to be situated within this working party rather than attend Regulatory Affairs?
- DWP = 16
- REGULATORY AFFAIRS = 1
- No comment = 3
- General comments that education is less of a priority/ preference but still required for SME's.

Survey Questions

- What would benefit your organisation most from attending this working party?
- Keeping compliant with all relevant legislation and standards.
- Keeping up to date with developments in “Digital” landscape.
- Information and knowledge sharing between companies.
- How to deal with the NHS requirements – issues and solutions.
- Promote standardisation across NHS as a group.
- UK and EU scope.
- Note on competition law = Discussing regulations, standards and different approaches is permissible. Discussing specific tenders and agreeing to any action that distorts the market is not. Policy advocacy and examining issues is.

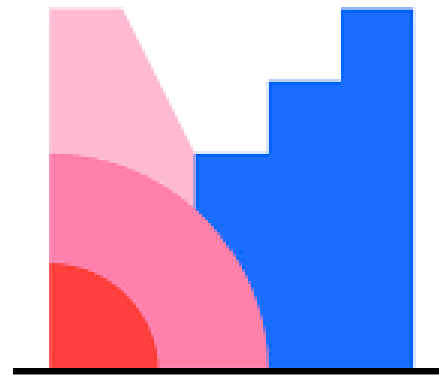
Survey Questions

- All but 1 member company says both, but all indicate that operational issues need to be addressed and understood before policy and BIVDA position can be determined.
- Day to day stuff can be boring.
- Policy to influence needs to be determined and a consensus agreed.

Survey Questions

- If both, how would you see this being undertaken?
- Ask companies for issues which can shape the agendas. (zero responses to survey's sent and no feedback from every meeting – this is why Ben called the group)
- Not engaging – people need to speak and contribute not just sit there.
- Cameras on and don't multi-task.
- Policy dependant on BIVDA staff
- Policy for the Exec Board
- Sub-groups depending on level of technical capability.

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
