2. Health and social care

This includes but is not limited to doctors, nurses, midwives, paramedics, social workers, care workers, and other frontline health and social care staff including volunteers; <u>the</u> <u>support and specialist staff required to maintain the UK's health and social care sector;</u> <u>those working as part of the health and social care supply chain, including producers and distributers of medicines and medical and personal protective equipment'.</u>
